DECISION TIMEFRAME

Applicants are generally notified of an admissions decision in writing within six weeks of the application deadline, though additional time may be needed to process out of country applications.

ENROLLMENT CONFIRMATION

To accept the offer of admission, students must submit a \$300 Enrollment Confirmation Fee for orientation and advising services. After you have paid your \$300 enrollment fee, WWU will provide the Certificate of Eligibility for the student visa.

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

The Office of Admissions will answer any questions you may have about Western, inform you of your admissions decision and determine the transferability of any previous coursework. We are here to make your transition as smooth as possible.

Admission Criteria

Admission to Western is selective. Cumulative academic achievement is the most important factor in the application review. Rigor of courses, grade trends, school and community involvement, special talents, strength of character, and personal circumstances are also considered. Applicants should have completed foundation course work in English, humanities, mathematics, natural/physical sciences and social sciences. Academic course work and experiences related to one's academic area of interest will further strengthen the application of transfer students.

The Admissions Committee believes that potential is measured by more than grades and test scores. All applicants are encouraged to help the Admissions Committee get to know more about them by responding to as many of the essay questions as are relevant. All documents submitted with the application become the property of the Office of Admissions and will not be released to the student. Notarized copies of international transcripts are acceptable for the admissions decision; however, if admitted, the student must present the original upon request.

English Language Proficiency

Applicants whose native language is not English must demonstrate English proficiency via one of the following options:

- Earning a transferable associate's degree from a Washington State community college with "B" or better grades in English 101 and English 102; or
- A recommended TOEFL score of 80 (internet-based) or 550 (paper-based); or
- A recommended IELTS score of 6.5; or
- · Duolingo English Test score of 105.

Students who do not yet meet this requirement may be eligible for Conditional Admission; see below. Official scores should be sent directly from the Educational Testing Service to Western's Office of Admissions and should be postmarked by published application deadlines.

Conditional Undergraduate Admission

Western offers an Intensive English Program (IEP) and Conditional Admissions status to academically qualified students who do not meet the university's English language requirement or who need more university preparation and English language study. Applicants must fulfill all other requirements for undergraduate admission, including having competitive grades from previous high school or post-secondary institutions. Students do not need a TOEFL/IELTS/Duolingo score to apply for conditional admission. Before enrolling in their first credit class and moving into full admission status, Conditional Admission students must attend the IEP full-time for a minimum of one quarter, successfully complete the IEP Academic English courses (academic preparation, writing, academic communications, and applied language skills), and demonstrate a high level of academic English ability, equivalent to Western's English language requirement. Students may apply for Conditional Admission by first enrolling in the IEP, or they may apply directly to the Office of Admissions. Find more information online at iep.www.edu. Financial Responsibility

Applicants need to complete the Declaration of Financial Responsibility on the application for admission to certify they can meet Western's estimated expenses for one year and there is reasonable expectation that funds will be available for the complete course of study.

Proof of sufficient funds is required for the visa application process to gain entrance to the U.S. For your convenience, you may upload proof of funds with your application for admission. Funds must be available from sources other than potential employment. Acceptable evidence may take the form of notarized bank statements in the student's or family's name; a scholastic award letter from a foundation, agency, government, industry, etc.; or a notarized letter from an individual sponsor indicating support for the specified amount and accompanied by a verifying bank statement.

While we offer merit-based scholarships, including the International Achievement Award, additional financial assistance is not available for undergraduate international students.

Visa Information

International students planning to study in the U.S. need a Certificate of Eligibility to apply for a student visa. This certificate, issued by Western Washington University's International Students and Scholars Office, can be either the Form I-20 or the Form DS-2020. In general students will be given the Form I-20 (which is used in applying for the F-1 Visa); the Form DS-2020 (which is used in applying for the J-1 Visa) is rarely issued to regularly enrolled students. To qualify for a Certificate of Eligibility, a student must be formally admitted to the University for full-time study. This document is not issued to part-time students.

Once the Certificate of Eligibility has been received, the student visa application process begins. Application is made at the closest American Consulate or Consular Section of the American Embassy. The Certificate of Eligibility, a valid passport, and proof of financial resources are required.

- 3. Describe any special circumstances or hurdles that have challenged you personally or academically, and steps you have taken to move beyond those challenges.

Post-baccalaureate Applicants: Statement of Purpose. All post-baccalaureate applicants are required to submit a Statement of Purpose that addresses the following items.

- 1. Why are you pursuing further studies? What are your long-term academic and professional goals? Describe your related experience and preparation either academic or experiential. Be as specific as possible.
- 2. After reviewing the requirements for admission to your intended academic program, including course prerequisites, how prepared are you to begin your program? If you need additional prerequisite courses or otherwise do not meet admissions requirements, what specifically are you lacking? List the courses you plan to take as well as how many academic quarters you plan to enroll.
- 3. Why is it necessary for you to enroll at Western? Do other four-year universities or community colleges offer what you need at this time? Can you meet your goals as a non-matriculated student, attending classes on a space available basis?
- 4. If you are seeking admission to an undergraduate program with selective admission criteria, are you assured departmental admission? Because capacity is an important consideration, please detail any information or advising you have received from the department.
